THERE NEVER SEEMS TO BE ENOUGH

Sometimes it flies, sometimes it crawls, but it always passes inexorably. We mark it, save it, waste it, bide it, race against it. We measure it incessantly with a passion for precision that borders on the obsessive. We are obsessed with it; we never seem to have enough of it; and yet scientists don't even know how to explain it. What is it? The answer is time.

We never seem to have enough time. A group of experts once got together to figure out how much time we should need to get everything done in one day. These experts got together and noted how much time was needed for exercise, hygiene, work, commuting, household chores, eating, entertainment, spiritual development, sleep, and family time. When these figures were all added together, the experts said that a human being needs 42 hours a day. That's not very encouraging.

- Of course, those are the things we're supposed to be doing every day according to experts. In truth, we add to that list as well. Consider that every day in the United States:
- ◆ 74,000 of us move to a different home and 22,465 move to another state.
- ♦ 36 businesses go bankrupt while 13,700 new ones start up.
- ◆ Americans purchase 38,082 new automobiles and trucks and smash 16,438. 2,266 couples get divorced while 6,578 get married.
- ♦ Dogs bite 12,329 people including 15 mail carriers.
- ♦ We eat 75 acres of pizza, 53 million hotdogs, 167 million eggs, 3 million gallons of ice cream, and 3,000 tons of candy.

The Psalmist tells us that "This is the day the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it." In other words, every moment of every second, and every second of every minute, and every minute of every hour, and every hour of every day is literally a gift from God. Unfortunately, in all of the hustle and bustle of our lives, we forget this. Instead, we are more often stressed out by his gift than thankful for it. Think about this: God gives to every one of us all the same amount of time in a day.

Sometimes it's just our perspective. What if we were to get up every morning and thank God and remember that "This is the day the Lord has made, let us rejoice and be glad in it." It wouldn't give us any more time, but maybe our perspective each day would change and we'd appreciate the gift of time a little more.

HUMAN TRAFFICKING AWARENESS AND RESPONSE EVENT

The Faith Based Response to Human Trafficking Committee in conjunction with the St. Joseph Council of Catholic Women will host an informational event on human trafficking. This event will be held on April 14, from 1:00-3:00 pm, at St. Joseph Parish Hall, 364 South Cambridge Street, Wautoma. Terra Koslowski, from Damascus Road Project in Oshkosh, will be the guest speaker. She will present information on what human trafficking is and the role Damascus Road plays in the community.

Damascus Road works to educate members of the community. It works to locate victims and to advocate for them. Attendees will have a chance to assist survivors through donations of money and hygiene and toiletry products. The following are currently needed (PLEASE donate only regular sized products-NO hotel sizes, as these can be reminders to victims of their being trafficked).

Jesus cares greatly for this creation; He made it. Jesus cares even more greatly for us; He made us. And Jesus never abandons what He creates. Jesus never abandons those He loves. We see this especially during the Easter season.

The first time Jesus raised someone from the dead almost seemed to happen on a whim. One time, Jesus was entering a town with His disciples and He saw a funeral procession. A widow was crying. She was burying her only son. The procession was carrying his body through the streets on what would look like a stretcher to us. Jesus said to the woman, "Do not weep." Then Jesus touched the stretcher and said, "Young man, I say to you, arise." The man sat up and began to speak (Luke 7). Jesus never abandons His creation, or us. He loves us too much.

The second time Jesus raised someone from the dead it was a little girl twelve years old. She was sick for a while, but it was too much, she died. Jesus entered the house with her family and neighbors wailing in grief. Jesus took hold of the dead girl's hand and said, "Child, arise." Her spirit returned, and she got up at once (Luke 8). Jesus never abandons His creation, or us. He loves us too much.

The third time Jesus raised someone from the dead seemed almost impossible. When Jesus arrives to Lazarus, it is the fourth day since he died. This is the day many Jews would regard as hopeless, no chance of any life again. Decay has set in. The body bloats, the body smells. Death has won, or so it seems. Jesus never abandons His creation, or us. He loves us too much. When Jesus arrived at Lazarus' tomb, the Scriptures say this,

Then Jesus, deeply moved again, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone lay against it. Jesus said, "Take away the stone" . . . he cried out with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out" (John 11).

Jesus is deeply moved by what we all go through in this life. He was so deeply moved He was willing to die on a cross in our place for our sins, so we won't die on a cross for our sins. And Jesus is so deeply moved by the creation He has made, and us whom He loves, that when He returns again, He will do the same thing for us as He did for Lazarus. Deeply moved, Jesus will stand above our remains and He will say the same words He has said for so many years, "Do not weep . . . child arise . . . come out!" and we will live again. Jesus will never abandon His creation. And Jesus will never abandon us, He loves us too much. Amen.



The Raymond Church, also called "Little Church by the River", was located on County YY, Dakota township. It was southwest of the White River dam. The building is still there but used as a summer home. The Raymond Cemetery is across the road from the church building.

This church was dedicated on July 11, 1893. The pastor was Rev. Rochelle. Thomas Henry Wedge was the church volunteer janitor.

Some of the church members were Silas Booth, George Wilcox Sr., Sidney Currier, Allen Deuel, and Delbert Raymond. Mr. Currier donated the land on which the church was built.
